About Donation

Losing a loved one is one of the most difficult experiences a family will go through; yet in the midst of tragedy, many families find comfort and hope knowing the legacy of their loved one lives on through organ and tissue donation.

Organ and tissue donation provides an opportunity to give the ultimate gift — the gift of life. Nearly 100,000 Americans are waiting for a lifesaving organ transplant and countless others need donated tissue. Organs that can be donated include the heart, liver, lungs, kidneys, pancreas and small intestine. Tissue is needed to replace bone, tendons and ligaments lost to injuries, severe trauma, cancer and other diseases. Corneas restore sight, heart valves repair cardiac defects and skin grafts help burn patients heal.

The Donation Process

When a patient arrives at a hospital with a severe brain injury, the hospital contacts the local organ procurement organization (OPO) based on mutually agreed upon clinical triggers and timeframes. While the hospital continues lifesaving efforts, the OPO determines medical suitability and whether the patient is a registered organ and/or tissue donor. The OPO and the hospital staff collaborate to ensure that the family is cared for and offered the appropriate donation option should death be declared.

Unless the family brings up donation first, it is only after the family has been informed of the patient's death and the patient is evaluated for medical suitability is the opportunity to donate discussed.

If the patient is a registered donor, the donor designation document is irrevocable by any person other than the donor. If the patient is not a registered donor, the family considers donation options and the donation process proceeds only after the family has granted authorization. Written authorization for donation must be provided, including a signed form which details the organs and tissues the family wishes to donate.

Donated organs and tissues are recovered from the donor by highly trained professionals in a surgical environment. The donor and family are treated with the utmost care and respect, while every effort is made to honor the donor's wishes.
