

Facts about Organ, Eye and Tissue Donation

- Your commitment to donation will not interfere with your medical care.
- People of all ages and medical histories should consider themselves potential donors. Your medical condition at the time of death will determine what organs and tissue can be donated.
- All major religions support organ, eye and tissue donation as an unselfish act of charity.
- Donation should not delay or change funeral arrangements. An open casket funeral is still possible.
- There is no cost to the donor's family or estate for donation. The donor family pays only for medical expenses before death and costs associated with funeral arrangements.
- In the United States, it is illegal to buy or sell organs for transplantation.
- A living donor can provide a kidney or a portion of their intestine, liver, lung or pancreas to save the life of a waiting patient.
